- 1. Professor Steve Rowlinson and Dr. Koh Tas Yong
 - representing the Department of Real Estate and Construction's Centre of Construct IT, Prof Steve Rowlinson, together with our collaborators Associate Professor Sid Newton and Mr. Russell Lowe, both from the University of New South Wales, Sydney, and Dr Koh Tas Yong have been invited to present and demonstrate the prototype of computer gaming engine to improve construction work processes and safety to the Chief Assistant Secretary of Works and other senior officials of the HKSAR Development Bureau. The event took place on 13 Dec 2013 at the Central Government Offices. Gaming technology makes BIM&GIS readily accessible to a multitude of users and is rapidly becoming an essential communication and collaboration mechanism underpinning these two technologies. The demonstration had aroused immense interest and support from the Chief Assistant Secretary. As a way forward, the Chief Assistant Secretary promised to push the technology for its adoption and further research and development in the Hong Kong construction industry.
 - on a related quest to introduce the technology to the Hong Kong construction industry stakeholders, the same team had also been invited to demonstrate the prototype to a major local contractor. Similarly impressed, the contractor had explored the possibilities of further collaboration to further develop the technology for use. The event also took place on 13 Dec 2013.
- 2. Dr. Shen Yuzhong (Research Assistant, Class of 2013 PhD graduate)
 - The PhD dissertation of Dr. SHEN Yuzhong under the supervision of Professor Steve Rowlinson was awarded as the Runner-up of the HKIE-SSC Student Project Competition 2013 in the Postgraduate PhD category. The winning dissertation, titled "An Investigation of Safety Climate on Hong Kong Construction Sites," focused on improving practitioners' perceptions and appraisals of safety measures on construction sites. The winner and his supervisor are invited to the Award Presentation Ceremony to be held during the HKIE-SSC Annual Dinner on 10 January 2014.

This dissertation has also received one of the Occupational Safety and Health (OSH) Best Project Award 2013 under the category of Postgraduate Degree Programme earlier in November. The winner and his supervisor are invited to the Award Presentation Ceremony to be held at the Hong Kong Convention and Exhibition Centre on 18 February 2014.
